



Did you know about Limpsfield Chart's connection with the world's largest archipelago, Indonesia? Or to be more specific, with Maluku (the Moluccas)? This group of islands is easily overlooked, and is located north of Australia, south of the Philippines, west of Papua New Guinea and east of Malaysia. At one point these islands played a significant role in the history of the British empire. When you put cloves in your mulled wine or nutmeg on your coffee and in your cakes, the spices originated from the Spice Islands, also known

as... Maluku. And spices have played a vital role in British history. The British and the Dutch exchanged Maluku for Manhattan in New York, because of these spices. Tip: do read Giles Milton's book Nathaniel's Nutmeg if you want to know more about this.

So, what do these Islands on the other side of the world have to do with our community here in Limpsfield Chart? A few Moluccans, including me, came up with the idea of setting up a free online language training which translates as Language for Family. We are an



online language learning community for Moluccans in Indonesia.

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Unfortunately, Maluku is still one of the poorest, least developed and least educated provinces in Indonesia. Many Moluccan students, due to their educated provinces in Indonesia. Many Moluccans don't have access to good remote locations or poor economic background, don't have access to good work end training, and miss out on scholarship and work end is language training, and miss out on scholarship and work end is language training, and miss out on scholarship and work end is large work end in the industry and academic with Maluku and they were contacted to share their skills, affinities with Maluku and they were gained in the industry and academic knowledge and experience, which were gained in the industry and academic world. We now have 165 registered tutors worldwide. To have such a large pool of volunteer tutors enables us to match the students' skills levels appropriately with the tutor's background. Those that speak Indonesian will tutor beginners, whilst native speakers will tutor more advanced classes. At the time of writing, we have completed 272 classes and are running 29 weekly classes.

We have now started our Year of Literacy and the first the first online Spelling Bee Contests for students aged between 12 and 17. Last year we introduced our Summer of Poetry where, during August and September we presented a collection of thirty poems written by twelve poets from Maluku. Their work was also translated into English, and we are currently in the process of publishing an anthology of their diverse and amazing work. We have been going for nearly two years and are growing fast. We can already see the real impact and benefit it has.
